The vigil featured speeches from event organizers, Janella masa, percent matar, Inori, Roy and Fatima Sade, in which they highlighted the tragic events taking place in the Middle East, and the journalists who lost their lives as a result. The vigil also paid respect to the writers and poets who have been killed. A poem written by neural Dena judge, a poet who was killed by an Israeli airstrike was read out by journalist Josh block, in which Nora describes what he suspects would be his last message to the world.

Again, my name is Nora arbitrage. I'm a Palestinian writer. I'm 27 years old, and I have many dreams. I am not a number and I do not consent to my death being passing news. The event concluded with a moment of silence one second for every journalist killed.

At this time, those in attendance were invited to pay their respects in front of a banner that featured the names of all 90 journalists who lost their lives.

Many residents in the besieged region. The majority of the new funding will support organizations such as the World Food Programme and UNICEF. Toronto Police are warning of an ongoing taxi scam. The scammers are tricking victims into thinking their taxi doesn't take cash to convince them to help out with their credit cards, which are then skimmed or swapped since June 2023. Over 60 scams have been reported to police resulting in over \$40,000 in losses. Police are urging individuals not to make payments for strangers in exchange for cash and to be wary of their credit card transactions. Following the January 10 budget launch, Toronto School Boards are calling for a more youth friendly city budget with more of their concerns here's Thalia saline.

Russian figure skater Camila volley Eva has been found guilty of a violation of anti doping rules by the court for arbitration of sport two years after the 2022 Winter Olympics in Beijing. She is now suspended from international competition until December 2025. The ruling disqualifies volley Ava's performances from December 2021 onwards, including her participation in Beijing, and prompted discussions on metal awards for the team skating competition. Amidst international scrutiny, the decision amplifies calls for greater accountability in combating doping in sports, particularly concerning minors. voleva disqualification will result in the redistribution of metals elevating the United States to gold, Canada will unfortunately remain in fourth place without being promoted to bronze, leaving the team extremely disappointed.
