Well, according to their website, and I quote, The tmsu works to build campus life, advocates for its members, organize campaigns and initiatives, provide cost saving services and work with students across the province and country. End. Quote.

I mean, yeah, that sounds great, but honestly, I still don't know exactly what our money is used for. According to the Tmu undergraduate calendar, we have 48,000 active graduate and undergraduate students, assuming we're all paying the same \$122 fee. That would mean that the tmsu is pulling in over \$5 million in student fees alone.

\$5 million that's a fat stack of cash. Ideally, we would have a member of the tmsu break down where exactly that money is going and for what. But after trying to get someone from the current tmsu on the phone for more than a week, we were told they simply weren't interested in speaking with us for the story.

Okay? Well, according to their website, they are responsible for a lot more than just events around campus. Did you know that they are the ones responsible for creating our health and dental plan every year, or that they run student academic advocacy, equity and sexual violence support centers on campus.

They also have emergency grants year round for students to apply for good food centers. And I even saw they have a Tax Clinic where they will do your taxes on campus for free.

Well, that would have been good to know last tax season, I had no idea they were even responsible for creating our health and dental plan. That's a lot of responsibility and trust to put into students.

I agree. And since the student. Body changes every year and is responsible for delegating where our money goes. I feel like we should hear more about the election process. I can't even remember hearing about there being a vote.

Me neither. But now that I think about it, I don't think it's ever been at the front of my brain, because honestly, I've never really noticed a difference in our Student Union, how it's run, or the services available to us regardless of who is in office.

That's a fair point. Why don't we get someone who has been in office to weigh in here welcoming David D'Aversa, former member of the University of Toronto Students Union, the student government for over 41,000 students at the St George campus.

So I was on the Governing Council, the Board of Directors, in terms of the specifics of what the Union did. It was all the above. Health insurance was a big one, dentist, medications, access to therapists, which was really important, anything that students needed. We were there. We had a food bank as well for the community. We had a bike shop. It was really great. Student initiatives. I do think, though, the work that we do matters, and it was the main point of liaison between the university administration and students themselves.

So after we recorded in the studio, we had a two time presidential candidate for the UTSU, which is the University of Toronto, Students Union, reach out to us with some great insight on why student unions are so important, and it was so good, we just have to include it, introducing Jake Barton.

Like any union, it represents an identifiable group that has a collective interest, you know, that being the interest of students. And there's so many different things it can do with that big functions of the Union, you know, as I'm sure you know, like advocacy, not just advocating to the university we attend, like, Hey, here's the collective interest for your students. They also advocate to different levels of government, which is phenomenally important, and it's something that when you pool all these voices behind the union, it's a level of communication that you otherwise couldn't get. You know, maybe two people would write to their city council and say, Oh, I wish we got a bike lane on this street, but a union comes in. They're like, hey, you know, 3000 of our students use this street. Put a bike lane on it. It's a lot more powerful. They also there's a community aspect to the union. They hold social events, they hold fundraisers for different causes. I think that's phenomenal. And then they provide resources to students. But I'd say the thing that has me as an individual, most interested is the pooling of funds, right where you can collect money from all your students. But from the perspective of the Union, you guys have such an incredible amount of capital year over year, and I feel like there could be a lot more done with it.
