it's official. Mark Carney is set to be sworn in as Canada's 24th Prime Minister this Friday, ending Justin Trudeau, nine year tenure. Governor General Simon will preside over the swearing in ceremony at Rideau Hall, including Carney's 15 to 20 Cabinet members at 11 Eastern time, once for an end, Carney will face immediate challenges, including a trade war with the United States under President Trump, Carney could call an early election before Parliament resumes on March 24

local taxi services and a Canadian ride share app are urging Toronto City Council to ban Uber and Lyft from Torontonians phones. The call to ban the American ride share apps comes after Toronto City Council introduced a buy Canada campaign in light of President Donald Trump's threatened tariffs. Taxi companies like Beck Co Op cabs and hover argued that they want to see domestic cab companies be prioritized and can handle Toronto's ride hailing needs. The cab companies also argued that US companies send profits abroad and in flight prices. Uber Canada responded by saying it contributes to the local economy and employs 1000s of Canadians. The city says it's reviewing options to support local services amid ongoing trade tensions with the US

in the back and forth trade war battle, Canada's 25% tariffs on nearly \$30 billion worth of American goods took effect at midnight. The tariffs imposed are part of the response to steel and aluminum tariffs that Trump has imposed on Canada on Wednesday, the counter tariffs will apply to American imports, including steel computers and sports equipment. Trump had urgently threatened to double tariffs on Canada. This was in response to Ontario premier Doug Ford announcing a price raise on Ontario generated electricity purchased by the US, but the measure has been dropped after Ford withdrew the electricity surcharge.

More on tariffs. Now we continue to watch the latest developments as it evolves on a daily basis. Joining us today is Gabriela Silva Ponte, who's been tracking everything you need to know. Gabriella, yeah, thanks, Megan. Considering just how much is going on at the moment with the tariff war, our reporters are certainly keeping an eye on Canada and US relations today. For starters, yesterday, our steel and aluminum imports were officially tacked with the 25% tariffs. The US president had been promising, but this on again, off, again. Concern has certainly been having its impact on the industry for some time now. Hamilton, Ontario has some of the major steel producers in our country, and it's such a hot spot for this industry that the Prime Minister Designate Mark Carney actually spent some time there yesterday. Regardless, some steel workers and business owners have been speaking out about how much of an impact this could have. But within Canada, that's not the only concern. The TSS has been dropping points consistently over the past few days. The Dow has also fallen and the Canadian dollar yesterday traded up for the first time this week, Doug Ford has continued to appear across American media outlets pointing to retaliatory tariffs as a solution, and again, like you just heard yesterday, the Canadian government announced it would be implementing countermeasures on nearly \$30 billion worth of American products. But this tariff ordeal has gone as far as Europe, the EU announcing yesterday it would be implementing tariffs on exports to the US, beef, poultry, bourbon, motorcycles, peanut butter and jeans are among the items discussed this after Ireland's Prime Minister visited the White House. This also comes after the US Secretary of State, Marco Rubio, said the annexation of Canada and the possibility of the US gaining a 51st state would not be on the agenda for the q7 Summit. That's all we have for you right now on tariffs, but I'm sure there will be more to come.

The Quebecois singers representatives took to Instagram on Saturday saying the AI generated music claims to include Dion's performances, name and likeness. This is the latest in the public fallout after an investigation raised questions about the singer's Indigenous ancestry and Canadian citizenship, the rescinded awards include five Juno wins, two Polaris music prizes, and her induction into the Canadian Music Hall of Fame. The organizations of these awards say they are taking them back as st Marie no longer meets their eligibility requirements, this after the singer songwriter confirmed she is an American citizen and not Canadian. St Marie is also losing inductions into the Canadian Walk of Fame and the Canadian Songwriters Hall of Fame. It is unknown what will happen to the singer's start on King Street, West st, Marie was also stripped of her Order of Canada earlier this month,
