Investigators allege the pair assaulted several people on August 31 including a 60 year old man at Nathan Phillips Square who later died from his injuries. Both suspects have been charged with second degree murder, two counts of assault with a weapon and aggravated assault.

He says pop ups are a way to revitalize an area and support small businesses.
