Well, we're about to find out. Our reporter Mariela Torroba Hennigan joins us. Hi, Mariela, thanks for joining us. So how does it work?

Thanks for having me. Ria, so as you can imagine, choosing a new president doesn't just happen in five minutes. It's a long process. I began my reporting for the story by interviewing Mark Schroeder. He's the vice president of the Canadian Association of University teachers, the CA UT, okay, and what did he tell you? He emphasized that point of how this whole undertaking is a very long and labor intensive process. His words, not mine. While there's no standard procedure across all universities, there are some consistencies steps that most universities will follow. For example, usually, once the Board of Governors starts to think of the next president, they create a search committee, and again, usually this happens in coordination with the University Senate, and how is that committee put together? It's not so much put together, but rather appointed by the board of governors, at least that's been the case this time at TMU's also told me that in other cases, universities may hire a search firm to launch this process, but he said that's a bit of a red flag for the CA, U, T, how come? Well, although he didn't get into specifics, I would infer that it's a lot of the that a lot of these executive search firms have big corporate clients, and that's often a red flag for public, post secondary education, or any public sector in general. I've contacted the Presidential Search Committee about this via email late last week, but I haven't heard back,

 - okay, and once a search committee is put together, what are some of the challenges going to he?

Well, for sure, everybody knows these are challenging times, and we've been saying that since 2020, even longer, but a new president is going to have to deal with, for example, restriction in international student admissions, which, remember, Ria, they pay much higher tuition fees. Another challenge is stagnant funding, or even reduced funding, and cuts to programs in some places and layoffs for staff and faculty.

Well, that sounds like a lot to deal with, am I right?

Oh yeah, it truly is a lot to deal with, honestly. Ria, the post secondary scene, especially here in Ontario, has been struggling a lot for the past few years, Premier Doug Ford's government first froze domestic tuition fees in 2019 soon after taking over from the provincial liberals, and those fees haven't changed since, while the costs of running a University of college have increased,
