Mayor Olivia Chow is faced with what to do about a serious shortfall in the 2026 budget plan, one measure is already in effect, a hiring freeze on what the city calls non essential workers.

 We're joined by our city hall reporter Olivia Zhong to bring us more on the story. Hi Olivia, thanks for coming in. So what can you tell us about this?

 Thanks, Sidra. Well, as Gabi said, it's a time of restraint in setting next year's budget. We haven't heard it being called an austerity budget, exactly, but the city budget chief Shelley Carroll has used the term Lean to describe what's coming next.

So what's the problem? Why the shortfall?

Well pretty much every year, the city faces a built in budget shortfall. The shortfall for 2026 is project projected to be over \$1 billion that's the money the city needs to find in order to keep its services running at the same levels as now in 2025 compare that amount of budget shortfall to what it was averaged before the pandemic, 500 to \$700 million now if the city tried to make up that shortfall through property taxes alone, those taxes would have to jump up by about 22% and that's not going to happen. Also, as we know, the condo market has slowed down. Some call it a collapse, and while that is up for debate, it means fewer property sales, so less revenue generated by the municipal land transfer tax, something the city has counted on in the past.

So I think you and I were talking in the newsroom earlier about a hiring freeze. What can you tell us about that it applies to what the city calls non essential workers? So who is that exactly?

That's a great question, and it's not entirely clear. A memo obtained by the Toronto Star says the freeze won't apply to roles essential for public safety, maintaining core services or meeting legal obligations. CUPE clarified with us that the city considers any legislated roles to be essential. So we're talking nurses, paramedics, firefighters, transit workers, and in the case of nurses, their numbers by law are not permitted to fall below a certain ratio to the number of patients in the province. But what about by law, officers, people in it, policy analysts. They're not really essential workers, but they are essential to the daily operations in the city. So for city employees, that may mean taking on more work with fewer staff, that leads to what, again, economists call reduced capacity. And as capacity shrinks, it becomes ever more challenging to deliver services at the same level as before, and that shrunken capacity to deliver services is something residents will most certainly notice. Gabi, thanks. We've got a lineup of juicy stories for you. Here's what's causing a buzz in entertainment this week, the Duke of Sussex, Prince Harry, is coming to Toronto starting tomorrow. In fact, he will attend various events ahead of Remembrance Day, that's a week from today, the prince is admired for his commitment to military veterans while here in town, he will show his support for members of the Canadian Armed Forces and discuss some of The issues facing veterans in this country and internationally, Harry will visit the Veteran Center at Sunnybrook Hospital and will attend an event called the true patriot love national tribute and to keep alive the legacy of his late mother, Diana, Princess of Wales. Harry. Will also attend a private fundraiser hosted by the halo trust, an organization that Princess Diana supported in her lifetime. The trust has worked for decades to reduce the estimated 110 million unexploded land mines still in the ground, nearly set in nearly 70 countries. Speaking of trials and lawsuits, you will recall that a month ago, Sean Combs, the rapper formerly known as Puff Daddy, also Didi, was sentenced in a Manhattan courtroom to more than four years in prison for offenses relating to prostitution, but the judge also recommended that combs be considered for a substance abuse program while he is behind bars, his participation could see his sentence being reduced by up to a year. Combs has been in jail in Brooklyn for the past 14 months since the time of his indictment. That time served also count towards his sentence, but Industry observers suggest that even a reduction in the sentence is not going to bring redemption to combs in terms of his high past profile a story in The New York Times reported that many inside the industry are, quote, deeply skeptical that combs can ever regain anything like the status he enjoyed when he wielded a Midas touch in music, fashion and media.
